MUSEUM PRESENTS EXHIBIT HONORING GRIGGS

When you think of historical figures, who do you think of? I'll bet you think of founding fathers and royalty, CEOs and socialites. Maybe you'd even think of musicians and politicians. As we look back on historical photos and films, we do not often pause to consider the people who gave us these precious gifts: the humble photographers. As Bartians, we are so fortunate to have such a rich and well-recorded history. We must stop and give credit to a man who devoted his life to preserving so much of that history. BAHM does just that with our newest special exhibit: "Bartlesville's History, Griggs's Legacy."

In 1908, at the age of 20, Frank Griggs arrived in Bartlesville, Oklahoma for the first time. He had traveled by canoe and by train to get here after being told that Bartlesville was a "land of opportunity." Over his 70+ year career as a photographer, Griggs took thousands of images. He did not discriminate. He photographed everything

from presidents to parades to street scenes and the Dewey Roundup. Griggs would climb to the tops of oil derricks and dodged bucking broncos to get the perfect shot. He documented everything from the amazing to the mundane. We have Griggs to thank for how well our city's history is preserved.

It would be impossible to display even half of Griggs's photographs in the Museum, however, a cross-section of his work is proudly on display. There is even a section of the gallery set up to look like Griggs's photo counter. You can see his inventive advertisement photos, the photographic equipment he had for sale, and lots of examples of his studio photography. Four cases of vintage equipment belonging to Griggs are on display including one of his original logbooks and plenty of early cameras. This exhibit is a must-see for anyone interested in the history of photography or the history of Bartlesville.

"Bartlesville's History, Griggs's Legacy" will be on display in the Pioneer Gallery until the last week of August. The Museum is open Monday through Friday from 8:30-3:30.

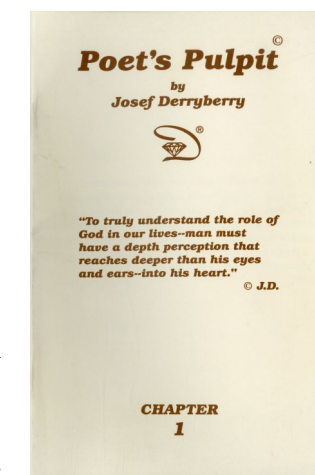

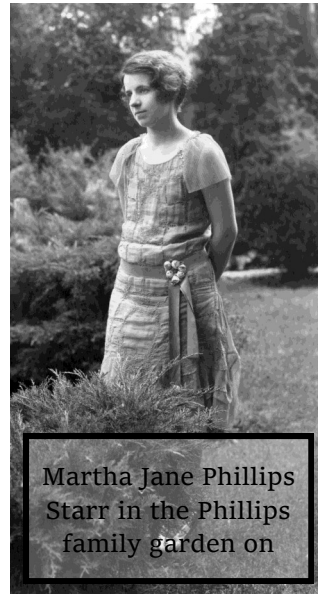

Ethan Starr and his sister Emma Starr with her husband Nicholas Tymkiw visited the Bartlesville Area History Museum in January. Emma and Ethan are grandchildren of Martha Jane Phillips Starr, daughter of Mr. L.E. Phillips, co-founder of Phillips Petroleum Company.

Martha Jane was born and educated in Bartlesville. After graduation, she continued her education at the Erskine School in Boston. She married John Wilbur “Twink” Starr who worked as a geologist at Phillips Petroleum Company. The couple lived in Bartlesville when WWII called John overseas and Martha Jane volunteered as the Chairman of Nurse’s Aides during the war.

Upon John’s return, the couple moved to Kansas City in 1933 and added two children to their family: John Phillips Starr and James Lee Starr. Martha Jane was an exceptional philanthropist and the Ambassador of Goodwill, a title bestowed upon her by the Principal Chief of the Cherokee Nation, W.W. Keeler, who later became the CEO of Phillips Petroleum Company.

In 2000, Martha Jane was highly invested in the establishment of the Bartlesville Area History Museum through monetary and artifact donations and she continues to support our Museum through grant opportunities.

Washington County history is much more than events and buildings, it is about the people who left their mark and touched the hearts of others. In March of last year, the story of John Delbert “J.D.” Starrett III’s Vietnam War experience was donated to the History Museum. J.D. was seeking his Bachelor of Science degree at OSU when he was drafted just short of completing his degree. Just four months into his service, he became the 9th Washington County casualty. To recognize his service, 15 medals were presented. To recognize his hopes and dreams, the OSU Regents posthumously presented his degree to his family during a ceremony on Friday, March 12th.

The family celebrated a remembrance at the History Museum, Thursday, March 11th. Present were: David Starrett, Sue Reynolds, Carol Starrett, Claudean Stotts, Larry Banks, Janice Banks, and Suzanne Brurud.

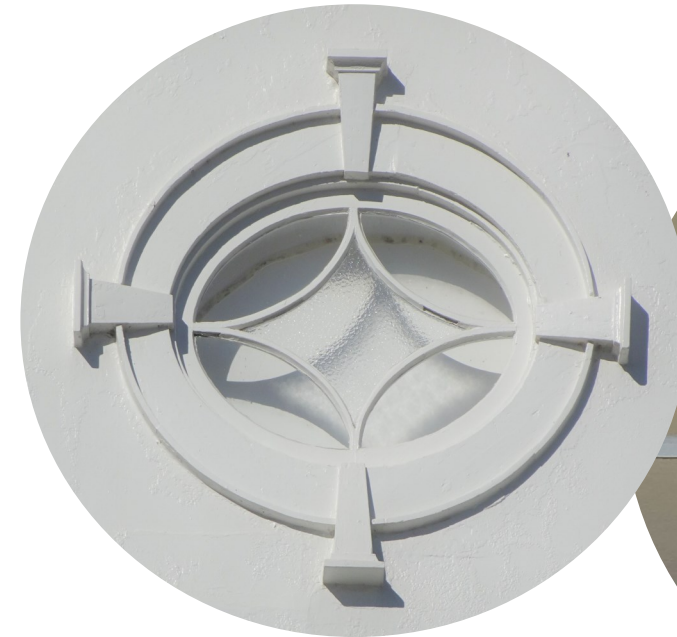

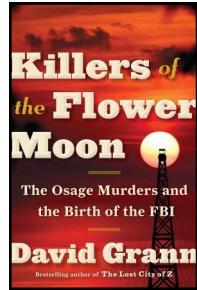

Killers of the Flower Moon

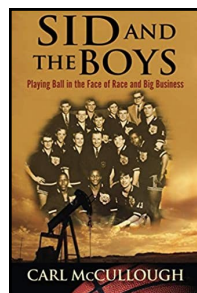
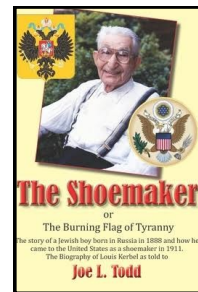

Sid and the Boys: Playing Ball in the Face of Race and Big Business

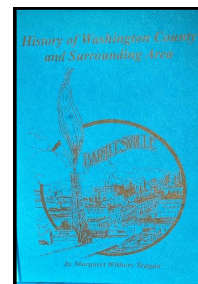
