

The Chastain-Toalson Lumber Company, owned by William Eugene Chastain and Oscar B. Toalson, was located at 300 Osage Avenue in 1907.


In 1909 the lumber company moved to 300-306 Cherokee Ave., the southeast corner of Cherokee and Third Street. Third Street was renamed Frank Phillips Blvd. on September 27, 1951 in honor of famed oilman Frank Phillips. The photo above shows Bartlesville's dirt streets, Interurban Railway trolley tracks and the catenary electrical system above the track. The Interurban ran the streets of Bartlesville from 1908-1920.

Between 1910 and 1912, Mr. Toalson bought the lumber company and renamed the business "O.B. Toalson Lumber."





Between 1928-1929 Jesse L. Overlees and William A. Kruse purchased the O.B. Toalson Lumber Company at 300 S. Cherokee Ave. They remodeled the building as shown below. In 2015, this is the location of Pizza Hut.

This amount of history has brought us to Adrin Haley Perkins. Mr. Perkins was born in Missouri on November 21, 1909 to Doctor Mitchell and Ethel E. (Cooper) Perkins. The 1930 U.S. Census lists Adrin as 20 years old living with his parents and 5 siblings in Jackson Township, Washington County, OK. Bartlesville was listed in census records and Bartlesville City Directories as Jackson Township until the early 1940s.



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
From about 1935 to 1940 Adrin worked as a cabinet maker at the Overlees-Kruse Lumber Company. Then in 1941 Mr. Perkins opened his own business, the Perkins Cabinet Shop, at 815 Shawnee Ave. where he did carpenter work, cabinet making and furniture repair.






Sharon Perkins LaFerry is the daughter of Darwin Perkins. According to Sharon, in 1943, Adrin Perkins moved his Perkins Cabinet Shop to 612 East 2nd Street (although the address was often listed as 2nd and Wyandotte) where he continued millwork, glass and mirrors and sold Pittsburgh Paint. Darwin Perkins returned from service in the CB's* after WWII in the fall of 1945 and went to work for his brother, Adrin, in December. Adrin and Catherine Perkins made their home at 126 S. Wyandotte, just next door to the cabinet shop and Mr. Perkins also had a store room at 128 Wyandotte. The Perkins celebrated 50 years of business at that location in 1993.




To offer a little Second Street clarification, let me insert a brief history of the Washington County Courthouse and the surrounding streets. The stately courthouse was constructed in 1914 in the <u>middle of the block</u> at Third Street and Delaware Avenue. The 1917 sketch below highlights the route of Second, Third and Fourth Streets.




The Washington County Courthouse interrupted the traffic flow on Third Street. This prompted Third Street to be re-routed and Second Street to be shortened.


Third Street was regarded as the main street through downtown. Travelers heading east on Highway 60 from Pawhuska had to make a decision when they arrived at Cherokee Ave. in Bartlesville.

To reach Highway 75 north travelers turned north on Cherokee, over the Cherokee bridge to Dewey and Hwy 75.

To gain access to south Hwy 75 or east Hwy 60, at Cherokee they turned south to 4th Street, east to Comanche and across the Veterans Bridge. At that time, Hwy 75 continued south on present Silver Lake Road to Ochelata (old Hwy 75 route). Highway 60 branched off at Nowata Rd.




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Significant happenings took place in Bartlesville during the late 1940s to early 1950s: Hulah Lake and dam were completed, the YWCA was built on Johnstone Ave., Hilltop Drive-in arrived, the Adams building and the Phillips Hotel were completed. But most notable was the death of Mr. Frank Phillips on August 23, 1950.

As tribute to Mr. Phillips, on September 27, 1951 Third Street was renamed Frank Phillips Blvd.

In 1980 the Frank Phillips bridge was built creating a third main artery access for Highway travel as well as easing the heavily traveled Hensley and Adams Blvd. In 1969, to honor Kenneth Stanley "K.S." Adams, 7th Street had been renamed Adams Blvd.



From the maps on page six you can see the transformation of Third Street to the present Frank Phillips Blvd. and Second Street now ends at Wyandotte.



Beginning in 1952, the Perkins Glass and Millwork Company address was listed in the Bartlesville City Directories as 612 E. Frank Phillips Blvd.

Adrin and Catherine Perkins' home remained at 126 S. Wyandotte until their deaths. Catherine passed away in 1985 and Adrin in 1993.

The Perkins Cabinet Shop, Glass and Millwork Company was listed in the Bartlesville City Directories at 612 E Frank Phillips Blvd through 2006.




1987 Perkins Glass & Millwork sign boasting 41 years of service in Bartlesville



At some point in history, the Perkins building was covered with brown siding but still proudly bore the Perkins name along Frank Phillips Blvd.

The summer of 2015 the building façade dramatically changed bringing the attention of Bartlesville citizens. For many years area residents have traveled past the block-wide brown sided building in the 600 block of Frank Phillips Blvd. without paying much attention. When the façade of the building was removed, the history of the building was revealed...preserved and ready to tell a story.





Behind the boarded building and bricked-in windows time has stood still. Wallpaper from a time forgotten, a small gas heater, a freight elevator for Freight Only, aqua painted shelves and knob-and-tube electrical works.



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One of the most interesting pieces of history discovered after the façade removal was the building advertisement for the Capital Hill Meat and Grocery Store which operated on Wyandotte from 1912 to 1919. From 1920 to 1922 the Capital Hill Auto Top Factory and various businesses occupied the corner. Then from 1925 to the early 1940s groceries operated in the building until Mr. Adrin Perkins moved his Glass and Millwork business to the building in 1943. Now we await the next chapter in the history of the Perkins Building.
